


The Latvian flag consists of three parallel rectangles, from the top down colored dark red, white, and dark red. The Latvian flag is a symbol of national unity.



History

In the 10 century AD, a number of early feudal principalities were established. From 1583 to 1710, Latvia was under the rule of Sweden, Poland, Lithuania, and Duchy divide. From 1710 to 1795, it was occupied by Tsarist Russia. On November 18, 1918, Latvia declared independence and established the Republic. On August 5, 1940, it was incorporated into the Soviet Union. From 1941-1945, Latvia was occupied by the Germans. After "World War II" it was re-incorporated into the Soviet Union. On May 4, 1990, the restoration of Latvian Supreme Soviet adopted the Declaration of Independence, and changed the country's name to the Republic of Latvia. On August 22, 1991, Latvia restored the Supreme Soviet of the Republic of Latvia and declared independence.

Economic and Cultural Customs

The country has well-developed animal husbandry, mainly dual-purpose dairy and meat and pig husbandry. Main crops are potatoes, sugar beet, and flax. Riga is the capital and is one of the ancient cities of Europe. It is the political, economic, cultural, and transportation center, and it is an important port city. In the Old City there are castles illustrating the history and style of art, with many churches and other places of interest as well. The town has wide, clean streets and magnificent architecture. There are fountains everywhere, as well as monuments and sculpture. Latvia's traditional industry is machinery. In addition, metal processing, the chemical industry, papermaking, textiles, and the food industry are all well-developed.

St. Peter's Cathedral

Located in Riga City, the ancient church was built in the 13th to 14th century AD. From 1689 to 1694 the Church decorated both sides in the popular Baroque style. Its smooth lines have prominent graphics and are decorated with beautiful portraits, known for their luxury. Its spire reaches up to 123.2 meters. Its tower is topped with a golden weathercock.

Dome Cathedral

In Latvia's capital Riga, the Dome Cathedral is located in the "June 17" square. As the construction process took more than five centuries, so its style reflects many periods of time. The architecture is of ornate, elaborate style. Finally, the cathedral is not only in Roman Gothic style, but also has characteristics of the Renaissance. In 1884, the church had a large organ installed. This pipe organ is formed from 6,768 wooden pipes, of varying lengths from 8 mm to 10 meters. With its precious combination of wood, tin, and lead alloys, the organ's sound is reputed to be the best in the world, soft and beautiful.

How can we hope to be salt and light to a hurting world if we don't interact with unbelievers and seek ways to touch them with God's truth and love?

Paul's instructions in 2 Corinthians 6:14 to avoid being bound with unbelievers is not an instruction to remove ourselves and shut out communication, dialogue, or even friendships with nonbelievers. God isn't telling us to run to our ecclesiastical sanctuaries and isolate ourselves from the world. Paul strives to clarify this in 1 Corinthians 5:9-10: "**I wrote you in my letter not to associate with immoral people; I did not at all mean with the immoral people of this world, or with the covetous and swindlers, or with idolaters, for then you would have to go out of the world.**"

Remember that Jesus sent His disciples into the world to make disciples of all nations (Matthew 28:19). You can't make disciples if you aren't going to be with people, befriend them, and share their grief and joy as well as the gospel. We have a ministry of reconciliation , and reconciliation reunites rather than separates.

We stand in the world in Christ's stead, urging people on His behalf to be reconciled to God (2 Corinthians 5:20).

If God is your Father, then invite the world to "visit" His home—to hang around you, for you are where He dwells and you obey the rules of the house—so they can get to know the Father of the house. Who knows? They may want to move in permanently under His authority and love!

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*Examine me, O holy and righteous Lord. Test my mind and heart and show me any way in which I have strayed from my devotion to You.*



**Wednesday, August 6, 2014**

Today and for the next several days, we're going to look together at what we often refer to as "the Lord's Prayer," learning from Jesus how we can draw closer to the Father through our time alone with Him.

The first sentence — **"Our Father who is in heaven, hallowed be Your name"** (Matthew 6:9)— calls us into the presence of the One who alone is worthy of our praise and adoration. It brings us before the Sovereign of the universe, who can meet our needs and satisfy the deepest longings of our hearts.

What is our relationship to this God whom we worship? It is nothing less than that of a child to his father. Can you imagine calling Jehovah, the self-existing, sovereign God, "Father"? To an Old Testament Jew, calling God "Father" would have been unthinkable!

So with the very first two words of this prayer, Jesus introduced a shocking new concept! "Our Father..." Those words opened up a whole new realm of intimacy. Together, we can cry out with John, "See how great a love the Father has bestowed on us, that we would be called children of God" (1 John 3:1). His Spirit living within us enables us to cry out to Him with all the trust of a little child, in devotion, love, admiration, confidence, and security.

Prayer is your privilege, your birthright as a child of God. Won't you talk to your Father today, beloved, and tell Him all that's on your heart?

Let's look today at the second sentence in the Lord's Prayer, which declares our allegiance to God and to His kingdom "Your kingdom come" (Matthew 6:10). Had Jesus not continued with "Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven," this phrase would cover the topic adequately. For after all, in giving God our allegiance, we're choosing to submit to His will.

After we have seen God and revered Him as the only One worthy of our praise, is it not logical that we would bow the knee and say, "Father, we want Your kingdom to come"?

Here is our opportunity to affirm daily our allegiance to His kingdom, acknowledging we have but one God, and He must rule today above all else.

Here also is our opportunity in prayer to expedite the coming of His literal kingdom to earth. The Good Shepherd cannot come until all His sheep are inside the fold. When we pray "Thy kingdom come," we are praying that Jesus' lost sheep would hear His voice, come to Him, and receive eternal life.

If you and I could catch a glimpse of how crucial our prayers are in preparing people's hearts to receive the seed of God's Word, I believe we would spend much more time on our knees! That's where effective evangelism begins.

Will you pray today for the coming of God's kingdom—and live in allegiance to His reign?

**Friday, August 8, 2014**

Yesterday we saw that the Lord's prayer leads us to affirm our allegiance to God by praying for His kingdom to come. So it's logical that we would next pray, "Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven" (Matthew 6:10).

Consider what this means, beloved: before we bring any petition before God's throne, before our prayers can be effective, we must submit to God's will. John 9:31 tells us that God does not hear sinners, but if anyone fears God and does His will, then God hears him.

In the pattern of the Lord's Prayer, petition follows on the heels of submission. The order cannot be reversed! After all, how can we expect God to grant us our desires when we refuse to submit to His will?

Submission to the will of God is the key to the storehouse of answered prayer. "This is the confidence which we have before Him, that, if we ask anything according to His will, He hears us. And if we know that He hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have the requests which we have asked from Him" (I John 5:14-15).

If you would know the will of God, you must understand the Word of God! The two cannot be separated, for through His Word we are sure of His will. Jesus puts it very succinctly: "If you abide in Me, and my words abide in you, ask whatever you wish, and it will be done for you" (John 15:7).

Today will you surrender your mind and heart to God's Word—and your life to His will?

Saturday, August 9, 2014

Whatever needs or concerns are heavy on your heart today, beloved, your heavenly Father does not expect you to deal with them on your own.

As a child of God, you have the right to ask your Father to meet your needs. Yet notice the pattern Jesus revealed through the Lord's Prayer, which we've been reviewing these past few days: petition comes after we've worshiped our Father, given Him our allegiance, and submitted to His will. Only then are we spiritually ready to ask Him to supply our needs: "Give us this day our daily bread" (Matthew 6:11).

Our petitions must coincide with who He is and with who we are as His children. Understanding this will keep us from thoughtlessly claiming a verse like John 14:13 "Whatever you ask in My name, that will I do, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son." Whatever we ask must be in accordance with His character. Reverence for His name governs our petitions.

And what are these petitions for? It's interesting to me that the petition is "give us this day our daily bread." This isn't a request for next week's bread nor for the coming year. It's a petition for the daily needs of life. I believe Jesus uses the term bread because it was considered the staff of life. Bread symbolizes all our physical needs, the things necessary to sustain our lives.

God wants us to keep coming to Him day by day, doesn't He?

God's forgiveness of us is linked to our forgiveness of others. Does that seem harsh to you, my friend? Is there someone you can't imagine forgiving? I understand that this can be a difficult truth to accept, but Jesus' words in the Lord's Prayer are very clear: "Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors" (Matthew 6:12).

To fail to forgive others is a sin, and if we are walking in sin, how can we expect God to hear our prayers? Failing to forgive others shows that we have no comprehension of the magnitude of our own debt to a holy God. So many people want to skirt the truth of these verses. They either ignore them completely or attempt to explain them away. Perhaps that is the reason for Jesus' words immediately following this model prayer: "For if you forgive others for their transgressions, your heavenly Father will also forgive you. But if you do not forgive others, then your Father will not forgive your transgressions" (Matthew 6:14-15).

Why do you think we tend to resist this truth?

Could it be that we want to come to God on our own terms? If so, we need to remember that we've already prayed, "Your will be done, on earth as it is in heaven." If we have prayed this, then we should be ready to forgive our debtors, even as God forgives our debts.

And if we're still unwilling to forgive, if we refuse to obey in this matter, how can we expect a holy God to answer our prayers?

Gracious and merciful God, thank You for Your clear word on forgiveness and for the gift of Your Holy Spirit, who gives me the power to obey. I choose Your forgiveness by forgiving.

What truth was Jesus exploring when He prayed, "And do not lead us into temptation, but deliver us from evil" (Matthew 6:13)? Is He indicating that God would ever lead us into temptation? Obviously not. So what are we to understand?

I refer to this portion of the Lord's Prayer as "preventative prayer" or "prayer for deliverance." I see it as the heart cry of a child of God who longs for righteousness and yet is all too aware of the weakness of his flesh.

Remember when Jesus warned His disciples about sleeping in the Garden of Gethsemane instead of keeping watch? Rather than catching up on their rest, they should have been praying, "Lord, my spirit is willing...but I know and understand the weakness of my flesh. And, Lord, I'm crying to You to keep me from temptation and to deliver me from evil."

In light of this, I personally believe this aspect of the Lord's Prayer is a means of watching and praying so that you might not enter into temptation.


In the Old Testament, in another "model prayer," a godly man named Jabez prayed, "Oh that thou wouldest bless me indeed...and that thou wouldest keep me from evil, that it may not grieve me!" Scripture goes on to record that "God granted him that which he requested" (1 Chronicles 4:10, KJV).

It delights the heart of our Father when we cling to Him for holiness.

"He who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him" (Hebrews 11:6). All our prayers must have this belief at their center.


Notice also that this closing sentence of the Lord's Prayer begins with the for. To me this suggests that all that has gone before is because of His kingdom, because of His power, because of His eternal glory. And we, His children, the sheep of His pasture, the people of His hand, shout, "Amen! So be it!"

As my beloved friend and oftentimes partner in ministry Alicia Williamson Garcia says, "Worship is a response to the truth." May we respond to the truth of who God is, remembering, "For from him and through Him and to Him are all things. To Him be the glory forever. Amen" (Romans 11:36).
